




## WHAT IS 'PREHISTORIC!'?

The West Runton Mammoth is a fossilized skeleton of a steppe mammoth found in the cliffs of West Runton in the county of Norfolk, England in 1990. The find is the largest nearly complete mammoth skeleton known, and is the oldest found in the United Kingdom.

> Once I trumpeted and heard Echoes ring the plain, Once I felt returning spring Changing snow to rain.





## **CARNIVAL OF THE ANIMALS**

## Camille Saint-Saëns (1835-1921)

Camille Saint- Saens was a famous compocser who was born in Paris, France. By the age of two he was learning to play the piano. By the time he was three years old he was able to read and write as well. He was interested in many



subjects like astronomy, history, painting and animal welfare, and was very good at maths. In February 1886 he composed Carnival of The Animals.




WHAT INSTRUMENTS DO YOU Think would play for a Mammoth?


